Professor Piotr Madajczyk, 1959, studied at the Adam Mickiewicz University in Poznań and University of Warsaw. He was awarded fellowships at the Institut für Europäische Geschichte in Mainz) and by the Deutscher Akademischer Austausch Dienst (DAAD).

He worked at the New Archives in Warsaw and Western Institute in Poznań. In the years 1991-1994 he was employed in the Office for National and Ethnic Minorities at the Ministry of Culture. Since 1990 he is working in the Institute of Political Studies of the Polish Academy of Sciences in Warsaw, where he is currently head of Department of German Studies and editor-in-chief of "Rocznik Polsko-Niemiecki" (Polish-German Yearbook).

In 1998 he defended his habilitation thesis entitled 'Tradition and modern politics. Policy and political ideas of Gustav Stresemann towards Poland (1915-1929)' at the Adam Mickiewicz University in Poznań. He became full professor in humanities in 2003. He was member of the scientific council of the Foundation 'Flucht, Vertreibung, Versöhnung' in Berlin and Foundation 'Kresy-Syberia'. He is member of the working group at the Centre for German Minority Research in Gliwice.

He directed a number of research projects funded by the Committee for Scientific Research and National Science Centre in Poland, including 'Forced displacement of Germans from Poland (1945-1948) - its functioning in the public opinion and the role in Polish-German relations', 'Generational melting-pot: the year 1968 and its impact on Polish-German relations (1968-2007)' and 'Social engineering. Projects of nation-state formation and their image in historiography and historical memory: Croatia, Germany, Poland and Ukraine in XX century'.

Professor Madajczyk participates in numerous conferences and delivers lectures both in Poland and Germany. He has published widely both in Polish and German scientific journals. He is also a frequent contributor to Polish quality press ('Więź', 'Tygodnik Powszechny', 'Przegląd Polityczny'), where he writes on various historical topics, as well as commentator on current events in Germany and Austria for various Polish radio channels.
